

Pastor's Notes

"I shall cultivate the ground around it and fertilize it; it may bear fruit in the future." Luke 13:8-9

Our God is patient and loving, and kind. Jesus teaches this repeatedly. Yet how often do we identify as God the owner of the orchard who wants to chop down the tree that has not yet produced fruit? How often have we seen God as the one who wants to punish us and ourselves as the ones pleading to God for mercy? Do we pray to open our hearts to the grace of a loving God; or do we pray to stay the hand of a judging God?

Obviously, our actions have consequences. It seems to me that too often we define as God's punishment the pain or difficulties we endure as <u>consequences</u> of our choices. We see it as unfair that all do not experience the same consequences for the same action, and some even escape consequences. We blame God for the unfairness. Or we refuse to acknowledge any advantages we have that make the consequences less severe for ourselves. We might even claim that we are "more deserving" than another and that God affirms this when we suffer fewer or easier consequences.

Jesus makes it clear in today's gospel that God is not the one who assigns consequences or punishments. The society of which we are apart determines who will suffer for what offense and to what extent. And those who suffer the consequences of systemic or economic inequalities will rarely be the ones responsible for creating and benefitting from those inequalities. God does not condemn the poor and reward the rich. God does not judge the unbeliever and defend the person of religion. God does not delight in those devasted by natural disaster and embrace those who are spared. God desires that each person come to bear the fruit of being fully who God created them to be. As Fr. Stan Ilo proclaimed in our first of three mission nights, God delights in our discovering and embracing the joy of who we are in God's eyes. When we are fully ourselves, we bear the fruit of God's graces within us. And God will continue to cultivate and fertilize the ground until we bear that fruit.

This week, our Lenten journey offers the opportunity to hear the story of a woman who experienced a powerful and transforming healing in her life. I am grateful to our local Knights of Columbus Council and our Adult Spirituality Board who make this evening possible. May we all have the patience with ourselves and one another that God has with each of us. May we anticipate with joy the fruit that is yet to be born as we grow under the care of the gardener who patiently tends us.

Scripture Reflections

Reflection for the 3rd Sunday of Lent 2019 Team #3

In today's Gospel Jesus only implies that we must not equate tragedy with divine punishment. Sin does not make atrocities come. They just come. Nor should we mistake our good fortune as evidence of God's special blessing. Jesus does not promise freedom from calamity, but urges us against false self-assurances. If life's fragility demands urgency, that urgency shows that life itself has carved out opportunity for us to seize God's graciousness.

The fig tree parable's power comes through the suspense it generates. Will fruit emerge in time to thwart the ax? How will this season of second chances play itself out? How do the gardener's efforts make the tree's existence a state of grace and opportunity?

For people of faith, catastrophes raise all sorts of questions that deserve discussion and drive us to mourn and lament. We should focus primarily on the fact that tragedies arrest our attention. They shake us out of the complacencies that we use to get through ordinary life. They impress upon us the perils of our existence. But tragedies also lead many of us who observe such events at a distance to protect ourselves with rationalizations and false assurances.

We have a lot of questions: Do we build our lives upon those rationalizations that allow us to get through the day feeling blessed, safe, and able to presume upon a better fortune than the victims and survivors? Or, do we build our lives on the knowledge that God's judgment is certain? Do we build them on the efforts that God, like the parable's gardener, undertakes to prepare us for that judgment? God transforms us through grace, a grace that calls us to be generous toward those still trapped under the weight of poverty, want, and devastation of all kinds.

Lent 2019 Catholic Lenten Practices

Fasting and Abstinence

All Catholics 14 years of age and older follow the discipline of abstinence from all meat on Ash Wednesday and every Friday of Lent, including Good Friday.

All Catholics 18 years of age, but not yet 59 years of age, follow the discipline of fasting on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. We eat only one full meal on a Fast Day and other smaller meals necessary to maintain strength and health.

Almsgiving

This traditional Lenten practice is associated with Fast and Abstinence. Money saved as a result of eating less or from "giving up" is given as alms to others who are hungry. CRS Rice Bowl or the St. Vincent de Paul Society are suggested charities for Lenten alms.

Prayer

During Lent all are called to renewal of our relationship with God through personal prayer. The community has opportunities for Lenten prayer as well:

The Sacrament of Reconciliation


The Lenten Season of Repentance and Renewal is the most appropriate time for Catholics to confess sin and celebrate absolution.



- How does the application/selection process work? There is a one page application, a face-to-face meeting with the members of the Board and then the Board votes on the slate of applicants.



Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

With this letter I write to you about a development that should disturb us greatly, both as citizens and as disciples of Jesus, the Lord of life.

Recently, two bills have been introduced in the Illinois House and Senate. The first, House Bill 2495 and Senate Bill 1942, both identical pieces of legislation, seeks to strip unborn persons of any protection – or even consideration – under the law and declare abortion to be a "fundamental right" and matter of health care. The end result is that an abortion could be obtained at any stage of pregnancy, including late term, for any reason and without any regulation. The law would no longer guarantee any modicum of humanity or compassion for any unborn person in Illinois, even if they are partially born. This legislation also repeals the Abortion Performance Refusal Act, which protects doctors, nurses and hospitals who refuse to permit, recommend, perform or assist in abortion. In so doing, rights of conscience, especially religious objections, will be lost.

The second piece of legislation House Bill 2467 and its identical Senate Bill 1594, repeals the Illinois Parental Notice of Abortion Act. This law, upheld unanimously by the Illinois Supreme Court just six years ago, has the common-sense purpose of ensuring that parents would be part of the life-altering decision of their minor child in the case she seeks an abortion. This effective law has reduced abortions performed on minors by fifty-seven percent.

As citizens of a state and people of faith who care about the common good, I urge you to join me and my brother bishops in an effort to defeat this radical departure from current law and practice in our state. Please reach out your State Representative and Senator to urge defeat of these bills. 



The Joy of Lent

Last Friday, Fr. Stan Ilo began our Lenten Mission by addressing the topic: Something Beautiful to God - Discovering God's Love this Lent. Below are some highlights of his talk.

God made us for happiness, God desires our happiness, and God goes about working for our happiness. Find the joy in your life and ask God really to show you - deep within your soul - that you are marvelous in God's eyes.

We are beautiful unto God. In order to find happiness and mediate happiness to others we must find beauty in ourselves, in all circumstances, and in all people.

God's love is God's free act to us - a love that saves, a love that creates, and a love that gives; a love that embraces us into this depth of divine love; a love that forgives and restores; it is a love that makes us whole.

God loves you. The proof of that love is what Jesus did for you on the Cross. If you were the only person on earth Jesus would have died for you. As Isaiah 61: 3 says, "God will visit those who mourn with God's graciousness and give them a crown of beauty instead of ashes, a joyous blessing instead of mourning, festive praise instead of despair."

Lord, Show each of us something beautiful about our lives. Show each of us something beautiful about our fellow men and women. Give us the grace to do something beautiful for you; something beautiful to show your love which we experience in our lives; something beautiful to make you smile for loving us. Amen.

Special Circumstances For Receiving The Eucharist

The Catholic Church has historically recognized the intimate relationship of wheat hosts and wine as matter for the Eucharist. However, if you have Celiac Sprue Disease or a family member suffers from a gluten intolerance or if you are alcohol intolerant, receiving the Eucharist is life-involving in seriously challenging ways. The logistics or manner of accommodating lay persons with gluten or wine intolerance in a parish setting during the Liturgy of the Eucharist is left to the afflicated party and the pastor to decide the best way during Mass for the afflicted party to safely receive the Precious Body or the Precious Blood.

Please Take Note...

In December of 2000, parishioner Dan Bagley lost his battle to cancer. While undergoing chemotherapy, Dan would often sit in the sacristy where he could hear the mass on the PA system and be away from the crowd to avoid being around excessive exposure to infections. After Dan's death, his family and friends purchased a new chair for our sacristy for use by those whose chemo might otherwise keep them away. As a reminder to all, especially new parishioners, anyone undergoing chemotherapy is welcome to make use of the "The Dan Bagley Chair" while attending mass. Or, if you have some other medical need for which the chair may help, you are welcome to use it.

Also, be aware that the parish is equipped with special hearing devices for those who need hearing assistance. Those devices can be found in the priests' sacristy.

For those who may be experiencing low blood sugar due to diabetes or other health issues, orange juice is located in the small refrigerator in the priests' sacristy.

Anyone with a physical challenge is encouraged to sit in the east transept (Spring Avenue side) near the exit door. A Eucharistic minister will bring communion to you, rather than have you approach the altar.
