

Pastor's Notes

Jesus said, "Do you also want to leave?"
Simon Peter answered, "Master, to whom shall we go?
You have the words of eternal life."
John 6:67-68

At some point, many who had been following Jesus walked away. As John writes his gospel some 70 years later, early Christian communities had seen many others walk away for various reasons, including to avoid persecution or because of the scandalous behavior of leaders who failed to be servant leaders in the way of Jesus. So why did so many remain? Peter answers for many Christians throughout the ages. Christ is the path to wholeness, healing, and life; coming together as church -- becoming the Body of Christ in Eucharist – forms, nourishes, and sends us as his life for the world.

I share the anger, grief, and sense of betrayal felt by many following the Pennsylvania grand jury report about the sexual abuse of over 1,000 children by over 300 priests over 70 years, made worse by the ongoing attempts of several bishops to cover it up. There is no excuse for church leaders who considered anything to be more important than the protection of children and youth. I grieve for those who were abused in western Pennsylvania; I also grieve for those among us who were abused as children or youth by an adult whom they should have been able to trust. Some of them will be traumatized anew by the failure of these bishops to act; some of them live and worship among us -- unknown to us because they choose not to share their story. Each of the bishops or church officials involved in the Pennsylvania cover-up over the past 16 years is responsible for the pain their deception has caused each person who suffers anew.

We must express our anger; we must share our grief; we must pray for the wounded in Pennsylvania and among us; and we must hold our bishops and other church officials accountable for their actions and inaction. I am heartened by the strong statement of Cardinal Cupich, calling his brother bishops to account for past, present, and future actions. **In 1992**, Cardinal Joseph Bernardin removed Chicago priests from ministry who had been credibly accused of the sexual abuse of a minor; the psychological community had just reversed its belief that proper treatment and follow-up could ensure that some abusers would never abuse again. He began to publish the names of these priests; he established clear guidelines for how future accusations would be handled, and a healing ministry for the abused. Had <u>all</u> bishops in this country followed his lead, how many children and youth might have been spared abuse by someone already identified as an abuser. There is no excuse!

Will I leave the Church? No. I stand with Simon Peter. "Lord, to whom shall we go?" I firmly believe that in Christ, living in us as church, is the path to healing for those who have been devastated by abuse and those devastated by the inaction of bishops. Christ alone can hold our anger, our shame, and our demand for accountability and transform them into redeeming action. I refuse to define church as the abusers, whether done through illness or malice, or by bishops who protected the abuser at the expense of the innocent. Failed leaders, like Simon Peter and all of us, must acknowledge their failure. In Christ, we are the Church! I choose to be part of the Body of Christ in which healing and forgiveness are available to all who approach with humble, broken, aching hearts. I choose to be one with those seeking to bring his life and light into the world.

Scripture Reflection

Peter's response can be our own when faced with the overwhelming mystery of the gift of faith in the one sent from God. Yet, we should be humble with respect to this mystery, for the gift is not given to all, but only to those whom the Father grants it. In light of this it is good to be patient with those who do not share our faith. And when another does come to faith we can be assured that it is not because of our wondrous evangelization, our dedication to a particular program, or our having memorized specific Scripture verses. God grants faith to those to whom he will.

Even Jesus himself allowed many of his disciples (not merely the crowds) to return to their former way of life when his teaching seemed too hard. Our faith is not subject to scientific scrutiny after which a demonstrable proof will be accepted by a rational mind. Instead, faith is a gift.

We can be thankful for this gift of faith that leads to eternal life. We can share it with others. But ultimately it is God the Father who is the giver. Once granted this gift, we, like the disciples, have nowhere to turn but to Jesus. In light of his challenging teachings, the response of Peter is our own. "Master, to whom shall we go?/You have the words of eternal life."

Letter From Cardinal Cupich

This section of the August 17 letter of Cardinal Cupich focuses on the Cardinal's reaction to the Pennsylvania grand jury report, issued on August 14. Next week we will provide the Cardinal's summary of what the church in the United States and Chicago is doing to ensure the safety of children and youth. The Cardinal's full letter can be found at www.archchicago.org.

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Anger, shock, grief, shame. What other words can we summon to describe the experience of learning about the devastating revelations of sexual abuse – and the failures of bishops to safeguard the children entrusted to their care – published in the Pennsylvania grand jury report...? ...And yet whatever words we may use to describe the anguish of reading about these heinous acts, they can never capture the reality of suffering endured by victims of sexual abuse, suffering compounded by the woeful responses of bishops who failed to protect the people they were ordained to serve. As the Holy See put it in its August 16 statement on the grand jury report: "The church must learn hard lessons from its past, and there should be accountability for both abusers and those who permitted abuse to occur."

I know that many of you are asking: How could this be happening again? Didn't the U.S. bishops address this crisis sixteen years ago when they met in Dallas? What are they doing now, and why should we trust that this time they will do the right thing?

These are precisely the questions that ought to be asked. ...I have asked them myself. And sorrow, disgust, outrage – these are righteous feelings, the stirrings of the conscience of a people scandalized by the terrible reality that too many of the men who promised to protect their children, and strengthen their faith, have been responsible for wounding both.

We know this not only because of the admirable work of the many members of the news media who played an essential role in bringing this crisis into the light. Now, we have been made to face these scandals first and foremost by the courage of victim-survivors – the men and women who found the strength, even when doing so meant suffering again unimaginable pain, to come forward and seek justice from an institution that grievously failed them. ...

The abuses contained in the Pennsylvania grand jury report are, as you know, appallingly familiar. And while it is true that the vast majority of abuses contained in that report occurred decades ago, that is of no comfort to victims, nor should it be to any of us. We cannot say this enough: the abuses should never have happened, and no one should have acted in ways that enabled them. ...

Anger, shock, grief, shame. There is one other word that we bishops must summon: resolve. We must resolve to face our failures and hold each other accountable. We must resolve to be clear-eyed about what we have done, what we have failed to do, and what remains to be done. We must resolve to live in the light of humility, of repentance, of honesty – the light of Christ. As your bishop, I pledge to continue holding firm to that resolve. And I ask you to pray for all victims of abuse. I also invite you ... to make suggestions for improving our safe environment standards, ever heeding the Second Vatican Council's "Dogmatic Constitution on the Church," which called on the laity, "by reason of the knowledge, competence or outstanding ability which they may enjoy... to express their opinion on those things which concern the good of the church."






Brick Pavers

We are SO excited to give you this update on the outdoor site improvements made possible through the contributors to the Capital Campaign!

The approach to Unity Hall has undergone a major transformation into a beautiful plaza! Decorative lighting brightens the plaza at night, and new concrete provides for better drainage and a brighter look to the area. And of course, the pavers look fabulous! When we contacted the Oremus and Hanson families, both SFX parishioners, to ask if they could assist us with procuring the brick stock, they generously offered to donate <u>all</u> the pavers through their

company, Illinois Brick. Representatives of Illinois Brick worked with us to select the color scheme and then deliver them onsite. Illinois Brick also delivered over 400 bricks to Impressions in Stone, where our first batch of engraved orders were completed. A HUGE thank you to the Oremus and Hanson families, and Illinois Brick, for sharing their gifts of talent and treasure!

As you can see when you walk the plaza area, there are many blank pavers that still can be engraved! Our next installation of engraved pavers will occur at the end of October 2018 or during the summer of 2019; timing will depend on the engraver's availability, the number of orders we receive, and weather conditions.





Parish Counselor


