Pastor's Notes

"They returned to Galilee, to their own town of Nazareth. The child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom."

Luke 2:39.40

On the night that the Christ Child was born, angels sang through the night sky and shepherds proclaimed the wonder to all who would listen. On the day Mary and Joseph honored the custom of presenting their first-born son in the Jerusalem Temple, Simeon and Anna sing the praises of this child and the light he will be for all people. Luke will tell one more story about the adolescent Jesus worrying his family when he stays behind on a pilgrimage to Jerusalem so that he may converse with the elders. The above two sentences, and one about the child Jesus growing in wisdom, age and grace, are all we are told of the family life of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph.

I hear in the lack of details that there was nothing that made this family stand out among others in the town of Nazareth. They lived the ordinary life of a tradesman's family. Mary would have cared for the home and made it a place of prayer and mutual love. Joseph would have travelled to wherever there was work for carpenters during the period of Roman occupation and much rebuilding. Both Mary and Joseph would have taught their son the stories, traditions, and practices of the Jewish faith, and taken him regularly to the synagogue and occasionally to the Temple in Jerusalem. This family would have had their minor disagreements and needed to work through the tensions that are a natural part of family life. At some point, Jesus likely would have begun to accompany Joseph as an apprentice to the carpenter's trade. He likely would have continued in this trade as he cared for his mother after Joseph's death. For thirty years, nothing extraordinary would have drawn special attention to the Holy Family of Nazareth; no one would refer to them as the "perfect" family.

So, what makes them the Holy Family that we celebrate this day? Perhaps it is the willingness of Mary and Joseph to allow God into the ordinary moments of each day – the joyful moments and the more challenging ones. They made a home for their child in which he would learn of God's love and God's promises as much by the way they lived their lives as by any of their words. They placed their love for one another above anything that might divide them, and kept God at the center of their hearts and home. They remained focused on what God asked of them in each day, and resisted the temptation to "take control" of their status or security among relatives and friends.

As we enter a new year, God invites us to welcome God into the ordinariness of our daily lives. Our "family" may consist of parents and children; of elder adults, distant siblings, and cousins; of partners, friends, or neighbors; of a precious few or more than we can count. We become "holy families" when we seek to live in love, forgiveness, patience, and mutual sacrifice for one another, calling out in the other the best of who God calls them to be. We become holy families when we make space for God on each day and each decision. What light that can bring to our world!

I have always loved hearing how Mary treasured the words of the shepherds and all they had heard. As a busy young mother of a newborn, far away from the comfort of home and the support of family, she probably had little time to think, but she kept these words in her heart.

It's Flu and Cold Season!

As a reminder during cold and flu season, please remember to protect your health and that of others. Proper steps would include:

- * If you have a serious cold or the flu, please stay home on Sunday. You are not obligated to attend Sunday Mass if you are sick.
- * Be aware that others might not want to shake hands during the Sign of Peace. They might be protecting YOU. Please don't attempt to force others to shake hands against their will.
- * If you are not feeling up to par, but you are not sick enough to stay home or, if you are coughing or sneezing, please don't receive Communion from the cup and do not hold hands during the Our Father; do not shake hands or hug other people at the Sign of Peace – a smile and nod of the head with the words, "The Peace of the Lord be with you" will suffice; do not drink from the chalice of the Precious Blood; receive the Host in your hand, not on your tongue. Although there is no evidence that germs are transmitted in this way your fellow communicants might be reluctant to receive.

Show concern for your brothers and sisters in the community, especially the elderly and chronically ill, and follow these simple guidelines to ensure a healthier winter for us all!

SAFE AND SOBER HOLIDAYS

Did you know that 10-13% of all the people in any community live with the disease of alcoholism or other chemical dependence? This includes 10-13% of our parish community. Each person who lives with a chemically dependent person also has a disease that negatively affects the lives of at least four other persons. 40% of the members of any community, including ours, know someone, or are concerned about someone, or are angry at someone who lives with this progressive and potentially fatal disease.

If you care about someone who has a drinking or other drug problem, I encourage you to get help for yourself. Go to ALANON if you are affected by someone's chemical dependency. Go to FAMILIES ANONYMOUS if you are the relative or friend of a young person with drug or behavioral problems.

Go to ADULT CHILDREN OF ALCOHOLICS if you are the adult son or daughter of someone with an alcohol or other drug problem. Get help for yourself before you attempt to intervene in the life of someone who is addicted. This is the best gift you can give to someone who is dependent on alcohol or another drug.

Here are some healthy guidelines for holiday drinking and entertaining.

HOLIDAY DRINKING GUIDELINES

Drink only if you can. If you have been told not to drink, or if you take medication that does not mix with alcohol, don't drink.

Just one drink can hurt you.

Don't drink more than one drink per hour.

If you can drink more than this without feeling any effect, you have a symptom of the disease of alcoholism.

A high tolerance for alcohol is a sign of disease – not a good thing.

Don't drink if you "don't drink." Don't take a beverage to avoid hurting your host or hostess.

Not drinking is okay.

Alcohol mixes better with the gasoline in a car than with the driver. If you plan on having a "really good time?" then plan on not driving.

Drunk drivers can kill people.

HOLIDAY ENTERTAINING GUIDELINES

Never tell a guest, "Aw, c'mon. One drink won't hurt you. It's Christmas!"

The calendar has no effect on the effects of alcohol.

Don't serve more than one drink per hour to any guest. Minimize the time before serving food.

Don't poison your guests.

Don't give a guest who "doesn't drink" a hard time. Don't argue when someone says, "No thanks."

Provide non-alcoholic refreshments and let your guests choose.

Hot coffee or cold towels only make a person who is drunk more awake. If a guest is drunk, do not let him or her drive home. Get them a ride or cab or let them sleep it off.

Drunk drivers can kill people.

Children's Liturgy of the Word

The Word of the Lord has a message for children as well as adults. Children's Liturgy of the Word offers the children an experience to hear the scripture in words that they can understand. Here at St. Francis we are fortunate and proud to have adult volunteers and Presiders of Liturgy who journey with our children so that they can experience the Word of the Lord with a message that is relevant and fitting for them.

Our Saturday evening 5:00 pm. Mass offers the opportunity for children in Grades Kindergarten—Fourth to experience hearing and reflecting on the Word of the Lord in a way that is an empowering experience. Children in these grades are invited to follow their Reflectors of the Word to a prayer space away from the gathered assembly to hear the Scriptures in words they can understand.

Children's Liturgy of the Word "kicked off" the school year on Saturday, October 14. 
