

Pastor's Letter

The glory of the Lord shall be revealed, And all peoples shall see it together. Isaiah 40:5

Wonder!

If you are familiar with Handel's "Messiah" the above lines might be playing in your head. The sounds of these weeks hold as much emotion as the many sights and smells. On Friday, I joined a classmate at the Old Town School of Folk Music for "Songs of Good Cheer." This event was founded by two former Tribune reporters who are joined by a wide variety of musicians from the Old Town School. The audience is invited to join in singing a wide variety of songs of the season: some old, some new, and from various cultures and traditions from around the world. There are sentimental moments that touch the heartstrings and rousing carols that lift the spirits. It offers what it proposes: a night to join strangers and friends for songs and good cheer.

At our parish this weekend, we flip pancakes and gather presents for those in need. Many seasonal traditions from various countries soon begin. This Thursday, those of Mexican and Filipino descent begin to celebrate the nine days that lead to Christmas. Las Posadas is a Mexican pilgrimage; people travel from house to house (or from place to place) seeking a place for Mary and Joseph to find shelter. The last house each night welcomes the pilgrims, and a celebration begins. This includes smashing a pinata, whose seven points represent the seven deadly sins and whose destruction causes sweetness (candy) to flow out for the children. Simbang Gabi is a Filipino celebration of nine Masses (originally held as fishermen were returning at dawn), followed by food and celebration. In each home hangs a lit star to welcome the Light of Christ. These two traditions culminate in Midnight Mass, celebrating the birth of the Christ Child.

How will you and your household prepare yourselves by "warming up" to the wonder of Christ's birth? Perhaps you will decorate a tree, bake cookies, sing carols, or read a favorite Christmas tale. Maybe you will share stories and memories of Christmases past, especially with younger members of the family who may never have heard them. Allow wonder to find a place in your life.

Tuesday is the Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe, the second celebration of Mary in Advent. Mary is believed to have appeared to a humble man of indigenous and Spanish descent and sent him to the bishop with a request to "build a church." She was dressed in clothing and surrounded by images that clearly proclaimed both to indigenous people and Franciscan who she was: the Mother of the Sun/Son. Several churches have been built on or near the site of her appearance over the centuries. However, the true "church" that still is being built is one that brings into one family all the peoples of the Americas both indigenous and immigrant. She has been given the title "Patroness of the Americas," lands in which those native to these lands and arriving from many other lands might learn from one another and witness to the God whose love is expressed both in our unity and our diversity.

I wish you moments of wonder this week.

OPLATKI


The Christmas Wafer (also known as "Oplatki") is available at the Rectory.



The word "Bethlehem" means "the house of bread." The breaking of the bread is a sign of charity, unity and

friendship. Religious family customs bring the truths of faith into the home. One of these beautiful Christmas Eve customs is the Christmas Wafer. The thin wafer bearing the Christmas characters is broken by the head of the family and distributed to each member. With a simple prayer for God's grace and the welfare of all members of the family, those present as well as those who are absent, the head of the house breaks the wafer and distributes it, one piece to each person at the table. While doing so, each member of the family is kissed and wished a joyful feast. Members then greet one another in the same way.

The spiritual lesson in this age-old custom is that the unity of the family is grounded in God's love for us. May you experience unity and love through this simple celebration.



SPRED Catechists Needed

SPRED is an Archdiocese of Chicago program that provides individuals with intellectual disabilities a caring environment to celebrate God's love and message. The St. Francis Xavier Saturday SPRED group is looking for catechists to work with our special friends who are adults, aged 22 and older. The group meets every other week for a total of twelve sessions between October and April each year. Catechists also attend a planning meeting prior to each SPRED session. SAFE AND SOBER HOLIDAYS

Did you know that 10-13% of all people in any community live with the disease of alcoholism or other chemical dependence? This includes 10-13% of our parish community. Each person who lives with a chemically dependent person also has a disease that negatively affects the lives of at least four other persons. 40% of the members of <u>any</u> community know someone, or are concerned about someone, or are angry at someone who lives with this progressive and potentially fatal disease.

If you care about someone who has a drinking or other drug problem, I encourage you to get help <u>for yourself</u>. Go to ALANON if you are affected by someone's chemical dependency. Go to FAMILIES ANONYMOUS if you are the relative or friend of a young person with drug problems. Go to ADULT CHILDREN OF ALCOHOLICS if you are the adult son or daughter of someone with an alcohol or other drug problem. *Get help for yourself <u>before</u>* you attempt to intervene in the life of someone who is addicted. This is the best gift you can give to someone who is dependent on alcohol or another drug.

Here are some healthy guidelines for holiday drinking and entertaining.

HOLIDAY DRINKING GUIDELINES

 Drink <u>only</u> if you can. If you have been told not to drink, or if you take medication that does not mix with alcohol, don't drink.

Just one drink can hurt you.

 Don't drink more than <u>one drink per</u> <u>hour</u>. If you can drink more than this without feeling <u>any</u> effect, it may be a symptom of the disease of alcoholism.

A high tolerance for alcohol is a sign of disease – <u>not</u> a good thing.

Don't drink if you "don't drink." Don't take a beverage to avoid hurting your host or hostess.

Not drinking is okay.

 Alcohol mixes better with the gasoline in a car than with the driver. If you plan on having a "really good time?" then plan on not driving.

Drunk drivers can kill people.

HOLIDAY ENTERTAINING GUIDELINES

 Never tell a guest, "Aw, c'mon. One drink won't hurt you. It's Christmas!"

The calendar has <u>no</u> effect on the effects of alcohol.

 Don't serve more than <u>one drink per</u> <u>hour</u> to any guest. Minimize the time before serving food.

Don't poison your guests.

Don't give a guest who "doesn't drink" a hard time. Don't argue when someone says, "No thanks."

Provide non-alcoholic refreshments and let your guests choose.

 Hot coffee or cold towels only make a person more awake. If a guest is drunk, do not let them drive. Get them a ride or cab or let them sleep it off.

Drunk drivers can kill people.

Surviving the Holidays

Some family situations can make the holidays difficult. For example,

there's no money

the kids are at the other parent's house

a loved one has died this past year

These top ten tips for "Surviving the Holidays" can help you exchange the dread, anxiety, or loneliness for a time of inner peace and hope.

1. Have realistic expectations.

This year WILL be different; resist trying to make it the same as other years.

2. Know you can stay home this year.

This year you may feel like staying at home, which is a normal part of grief and healing. Many people may insist—maybe even push—to get you out. Be honest with yourself. If you are overwhelmed and need the security of solace, give yourself permission to stay in. If you go to the party and are ambushed by extreme emotions, give yourself permission to thank the host and leave early.

3. Do something special for yourself.

Plan a time close to Christmas day to go to a good movie, do a little window shopping, drop into church for a prayer, or enjoy a special treat. It doesn't have to be lavish. If you'd rather stay home, then download a favorite movie, cook a favorite meal, and cozy up in a way that comforts you.

4. Do something for someone else.

One of the best ways to come out of our misery is to help someone else. Volunteering restores many to the reality that God is good and there are many things for which to be thankful. Some focus their attention on Christmas presents for the children.

5. Keep it simple.

Having a Christmas tree may cheer up some; but for others it will be too depressing. Sending Christmas cards can be very therapeutic; but for some it is a time-consuming and unnecessary expense. Re-examine *everything* you used to do during the holidays; keep what works and let go of the rest.

6. Keep in touch with the children.

Children crave routines and rituals, which give them a sense of security—especially holiday customs. Keep as many of the holiday routines that *they* best love. Ask what *their* favorites are and help them focus on the fun.

7. Don't celebrate with your ex.

Unless it's been years, the kids are older, *and* you really do get along well. It sounds good that you should all be able to get along at the holidays—but it's most often a myth. In most cases it confuses everyone, especially the children.

8. Help the children buy a present for their other parent.

Imagine how difficult it can be to get a present for mom or dad without any help. Some things should never change: like encouraging children to love, honor, and respect both parents.

9. Draw close to God.

This holiday is about the answer to every person's prayer: God come to us in the flesh. Let Mary's kind eyes fall upon you and Joseph's strong gaze give you hope.

10. Go to Christmas Mass and rejoice in your heart.

On Christmas day your emotions may be extremely tender; the tears may flow, and the cries of your heart may mix with the strains of "Silent Night." But come. Come as you are. Know that you are loved. Know that there is hope. Know that there will be resurrection and salvation. This is the hope of these holidays.

O come, let us adore our God made flesh in Jesus.




