

Pastor's Notes

"When the centurion saw how he breathed his last he said, 'Truly this man was the Son of God!'"

Mark 15:39

A centurion, a Roman soldier with no connection to the Jewish covenant, testifies that Jesus is the fulfillment of this covenant. Mark provides no details about what the centurion saw in the last breath of Jesus that so convinced him of this truth. He leaves it for us to reflect upon.

The final words of Jesus in Mark's Passion account express the feeling that God has forsaken him. Mark associates no words with the "loud cry" that precedes the last breath of Jesus. So, what did the centurion see and hear? Surely it was not the look and sound of desperation. The centurion would not have come to his bold proclamation of faith if all he witnessed was the last breath of someone who had given up all hope.

Many of us have had the difficult yet sacred grace of being with a loved one as she or he transitioned from this life to the fuller life that awaits us. In the final days or hours of journeying with someone in hospice care, we often sense that the person is struggling between hanging on and letting go – a journey that can be painful to accompany. The person may seem frightened, or resistant, or lost as death nears. Yet many of us also have experienced a moment of peaceful surrender just before our loved one lets go. Someone recently shared, "She seemed to be seeing something that we could not see, and her face was calm and expectant."

I sense that this is what the centurion saw on the face of Jesus as he breathed his last. He had been witnessing a man in great anguish, experiencing the hopelessness and abandonment that was part of the cruel intent of crucifixion. Yet in those final moments, he suddenly witnessed a transformation of that anguish into peaceful surrender – not to the finality of death; but to a light beyond death. The centurion saw something that led him to profess that this death was no ordinary death; that its importance was far beyond anything he had ever experienced.

This week we journey with Jesus through the deepest mysteries of our faith: the gift of the Eucharist, which joins us to Jesus in loving service of others; the sacrifice of the Cross, through which we lovingly offer our lives for others; and the transforming power of Resurrection, through which God brings new life and hope, even out of the most painful experiences of our lives. I encourage you to join the parish for as many of the three nights before Easter Sunday as you are able. I also invite you to spend some time this week in prayer with the centurion. Allow yourself to see, through his eyes, the promise of Easter at the foot of the Cross.

Scripture Reflection

Branches of palm, olive, or sometimes even budding willow, are ancient symbols of victory and hope, as well as of new life. The procession celebrating Jesus' entry into Jerusalem overflowed with praise and excitement, as onlookers waved these triumphant branches and proclaimed their blessings. Yet, in a few days, they will cry "Crucify him!" The crowd's change of heart illustrates the problem of holding God to our expectations. The crowd expected a liberating leader, the Messiah, to free them from Roman oppression. Jesus instead takes up his Cross and invites us to do the same. Through his Death and Resurrection he is indeed a liberator, but from death and sin, not from Rome. But unable to see past their need, the crowd's disappointment turns into anger and a death order. As we enter Holy Week, Palm Sunday teaches us to let God be God, and to trust in God's wisdom not only to meet but shatter and exceed our expectations.

Lent 2018 Catholic Lenten Practices

Fasting and Abstinence

All Catholics 14 years of age and older follow the discipline of abstinence from all meat on Ash Wednesday and every Friday of Lent, including Good Friday.

All Catholics 18 years of age, but not yet 59 years of age, follow the discipline of fasting on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. We eat only one full meal on a Fast Day and other smaller meals necessary to maintain strength and health.

Almsgiving

This traditional Lenten practice is associated with Fast and Abstinence. Money saved as a result of eating less or from "giving up" is given as alms to others who are hungry. CRS Rice Bowl or the St. Vincent de Paul Society are suggested charities for Lenten alms.

Prayer

During Lent all are called to renewal of our relationship with God through personal prayer. The community has opportunities for Lenten prayer as well:

The Sacrament of Reconciliation

The Lenten Season of Repentance and Renewal is the most appropriate time for Catholics to confess sin and celebrate absolution.

The St. Francis Xavier Day School is one of the many wonderful ministries within the St. Francis Xavier Parish. We are fortunate to have an active School Advisory Board that works throughout the year on behalf of our school and parish community.

The purpose of the School Advisory Board is to:

- Develop, formulate, and adopt policies which govern the operation of the School




