Pastor's Notes

"My peace I give to you. Not as the world gives do I give it to you." John 14:27

Today's first reading from Acts of the Apostles is Luke's account of a critical moment in the life of the early church. St. Paul had been so successful in his early missionary journeys through the eastern Mediterranean that both Jews and Gentiles were being baptized. However, Gentile converts were not taking on the customs and traditions of Mosaic Law, which had remained essential to many Jewish Christians. The tension was most felt when early Christian communities gathered for Eucharist, which often was celebrated as part of a larger meal in which each household brought food to eat and to share. Gentiles might bring foods that were forbidden to Jews, such as pork. They did not observe all the rituals of their Jewish sisters and brothers. Could Gentiles, whom Jewish Christians previously had considered pagans, become Christian without also adopting Jewish religious practices?

Luke presents a practical, political solution as the outcome of the first church Council. Gentile Christians are asked to abstain from those practices most disturbing to Jewish Christians and thereby achieve peace within the community. However, there is an older account of this Council. More than ten years earlier, St. Paul provides his account of the first Council in his letter to the Galatians. In this older account, the Council places <u>no</u> restrictions on Gentile Christians; instead, the Council encourages them to be charitable in giving to those in need. Peace within

the community is to be achieved by all Christians through promoting and respecting the diversity of the community while deepening their *unity in Christ*. Each is to respect the customs and traditions of the other as together they live the mission of reaching out to those in need in the name of Jesus.

Why two accounts of the first Council? It seems that some were not satisfied with the decision of the Council. They attempted to rewrite history by creating the story of a non-existent letter that expressed what they thought the council *should* have said. They tried to impose *the type of peace the world gives*, which often asks one side to "give in" to the demands of the other. Jesus offers *a peace that comes from a deeper place*. This is the peace of the Spirit, who brings a harmony that embraces both diversity <u>and</u> unity. Decisions are made in love and respect for one another rather than imposed by one group upon another.

We, the Church, and we, members of society, are challenged to invite this *peace of the Spirit* into our lives. As we remember those who gave their lives to prevent *any* group from imposing its will upon others, we pray for the courage and compassion of the Spirit to honor them by doing the same in our day.

Scripture Reflections

Over the past three years, I have had the privilege of delving into contemplative prayer with a group of sixty women and men from throughout the Chicagoland area. We have all made a commitment of study and daily prayer, guided by the wisdom of such mentors as Thomas Merton, Thomas Keating, Cynthia Bourgeault and Kathleen Dowling Singh. The prayer involves carving out 20-30 minutes a day to sit in God's presence. It usually begins with a focus on one's breath or a simple sacred word or phrase (Abba, Jesus, peace, be still, love, etc.), and continues by just letting go. It is not about emptying your mind as much as it is about being open and fully present to God. When your mind wanders, you gently return to the breath or sacred word. It is well known among contemplative pray-ers that the greatest benefits come not during the "sits," but after them, in the peace and groundedness that remains.

In today's gospel, Jesus shares those words we hear at every mass: "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you." He goes on to say, "Do not let your hearts be troubled or afraid." God's desire for us is to remain rooted in divine love, free from fear and anxiety, at peace in the very core of our being. It doesn't mean we will not face adversity, conflict, stress, illness, etc. – we will. It means that none of those define us. No matter what is happening, God is there. Christ has conquered death, and love always has the last word. May we be open and fully present to God in our midst. May we always trust in God's love. And may we be so rooted in the Peace of Christ that it flows through us to everyone around us.

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Blessings to you in this joyful season of Easter. In keeping with my pledge to update you on the Church's efforts regarding safeguarding of children, I want to share an important step taken by Pope Francis. This past Friday he published an executive order mandating that all bishops implement a new universal law requiring all dioceses and religious orders to report abuse of minors and vulnerable adults. The new law provides a process for investigating abuse by any member of the hierarchy, including cardinals, bishops and priests as well as religious men and women. There is also a process for investigating the mishandling of such cases by bishops. Now, all bishops' conferences and religious congregations in every country around the world will have to meet more rigorous standards.

This unprecedented development comes less than three months after the Holy Father's meeting in Rome with all religious superiors and presidents of bishops' conferences from around the world. On that occasion the Pope promised concrete action. The announcement along with the norms he published earlier for the Vatican City State, demonstrate his resolve to put an end to cover ups and take decisive action to rid the Church of the scourge of abuse of minors. For your convenience, you can read <u>the full statement</u> the archdiocese released on the law. I invite you to share this information with your family members and friends. As I noted in that statement: "While this new law validates many of the procedures already in place in the Archdiocese of Chicago and in the United States, it provides a framework for the bishops in this country to adopt measures at our June meeting that will both implement the Pope's executive order and address the issue of holding everyone in the Church accountable."

As our auxiliary bishops and I prepare to attend that meeting in a few weeks, I pledge to you once again that I will do my best to see that our response in June, as well as our ongoing efforts in this regard, are marked by responsibility, accountability and transparency.
