Pastor's Notes

"You will be my witnesses...to the ends of the earth." Acts of the Apostles 1:8

Saint Luke's sequel to his gospel tells the story of the early church as it extends from Jerusalem through Antioch to Rome. The Roman empire had extended its power and influence into what was known to the first disciples as "the ends of the earth." On the day of his Ascension into heaven, they could not comprehend the vast mission Jesus was giving them. This would develop through the coming of the Spirit at Pentecost, the missionary journeys of St. Paul, and the persecution of the early Christians in Jerusalem and throughout the Roman world.

We enter the last week of the Easter Season with this reminder of *our mission in Christ. It is not enough* to believe that Jesus is the Son of God, risen from the dead. *It is not enough* to have been baptized and confirmed, or to attend Mass faithfully each week. These things are important; they name us and shape us and strengthen us as disciples of Christ. Yet the most important thing is that *Jesus sends us as witness to the ends of the earth*, known as such by our actions even more than by our words. *This is our mission and purpose* in Christ.

We pray for this grace as we enter the time of summer. We ask that those who encounter us in parks and campgrounds, at amusement parks and ballgames, during backyard barbecues and block parties, will glimpse the presence of Christ in the way we are with others. We hope that anyone who identifies us Catholic, or as a member of the Catholic Christian community of St. Francis Xavier Parish, will do so with positive thoughts of who we are and what we are about.

In short, we pray for the presence and indwelling of the Holy Spirit, who inspires us to be all that we have been created to be as beloved children of God. This week before Pentecost offers us an opportunity to reflect on where, in our lives, we seek the strength and comfort of the Spirit. What is my "growing edge" as a disciple? What one shift in attitude or action will make God more present to those around me? What is my mission, my *witness to the ends of the earth* this summer?

This Tuesday evening, we celebrate the young women and men of the St. Francis Xavier Elementary School Class of 2019. We thank the parents who have made their years at St. Francis Xavier possible, including twenty-six parish families who celebrate the graduation of their youngest child at St. Francis Xavier School. We thank the teachers and staff that have taught and guided them. The members of the class of 2019 who planned the Mass that will precede their graduation ceremony chose to give thanks for their elementary school years not by looking back, but by focusing on their mission to *go make a difference* in the next chapter of their lives. This fall they enter the second and final year of preparation for Confirmation through our Quest youth program. I look forward to their broader involvement in parish life, ministry, and service. In small groups led by parish adults, they will reflect on the challenges of living our faith in the larger world of high school. Our faith community needs their active witness through regular *prayer*, lifelong *learning*, and loving *service*. They need the same from us. May we encourage them by word and witness to set the world on fire.

Scripture Reflections

How ironic it was, it seemed to me, when on April 27th 1974 I was ordained a Deacon. On that day I had to promise celibacy for the rest of my life. I found it ironic, because it was my birthday and on the very day my mother gave birth to me, I had to promise that I would not give birth to anyone else. I thought that God was having a little fun on my behalf.

Now, as I face retirement in a few weeks, I have been given the weekend of June 2^{nd} to write my last scripture reflection. What is the feast for the day, why the Ascension, the very time when Jesus is telling his disciples, good-bye. I have been with you for a while, but now I am leaving you. Really, God, I sense that you are smiling again.

There is a prayer at the end of a funeral Mass that says the following. "There is sadness in our parting, but one day we shall see him/her again and enjoy their friendship and love." There is a sadness when there is an end of anything, whether it is a graduation, a championship, retirement, or a death. But in each case, there is a promise of something new and exciting. It can be unsettling and scary, but it can also be an opportunity of new life and fulfillment.

In the Gospel, today, St Luke writes, "They did him homage and then returned to Jerusalem with great joy." I think that St. Luke has buried some of the feelings Jesus' disciples had at that time. Certainly they were not facing his passion and death this time, but even with the joy and comfort of the resurrection fresh in their minds, some sadness and pain had to be theirs.

Ultimately, what brings this joy that St. Luke writes about is the coming of the Spirit and the realization that in prayer and in Eucharist Christ was still present with them. He had not left them orphaned but was alive to them in a new and exciting way. They truly were blessed.


Commemorative Anniversary Book

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Collection For Retired Priests



Next weekend, we will take up a special collection for the Retired Priests. There are over 200 Retired Archdiocesan Priests. They represent 30% of all the priests serving in the Archdiocese. Normal retirement age is 70 for Chicago priests. Sixty-five priests still live in a rectory and assist the parish on a regular basis. Close to 140 retired priests celebrate Sunday Mass weekly, perform marriages and baptisms; and visit the sick in hospitals. Without these dedicated men, many parishes would not be able to offer the full range of Masses and sacraments that are currently available.

This collection is solely for the retired priests of the Archdiocese of Chicago. The retired priests of the Archdiocese receive no funds from the Religious Retirement Collection taken up in December. Those funds go for religious nuns and brothers and religious order priests.

The Archdiocese of Chicago is committed to caring for our retired priests, but we need your assistance and the generosity of every parish community.

Our Berghaus Pipe Organ

I am pleased to announce that we are a couple of steps closer to completing the original vision of our beautiful pipe organ built in 2003 by Berghaus Pipe Organ, Bellwood, IL. The installation of the full plan for our pipe organ was cut short due to boiler problems in 2003. Some of the allocated funds for the organ had to be moved to fix the boiler, leaving the installation of the organ incomplete.

Thanks to the support of a parishioner's generous monetary gift, we now have the prepared *Rauschpfeife III* and *Clarion* stops completed and installed. My sincere gratitude and thanks to that parishioner, who wishes to remain anonymous.

Full completion of the installation plan would involve adding two final elements: *Chimes* and the *Trompette Royale*. This beautiful instrument will continue to enhance our worship for years to come. Thank you!
