

Pastor's Notes

"All things are possible with God."
Mark 10:27

A prosperous and generous man in another parish once asked me, "Father, why is Jesus so critical of wealth?" I shared my understanding that Jesus is not concerned with the wealth we possess, but rather the wealth that possesses us. The rich man in today's gospel is living a good and holy life. He has observed God's commandments of love since his youth. Yet he wants to know what more he can do. Note that Jesus looks at him and loves him before asking what the man is not yet ready to do: "Sell what you have, give to the poor, and then come, follow me." The many possessions of this loving and generous man have come to define and possess him. He cannot yet let go, so he walks away sad. Jesus then tells his disciples that what seems impossible for the man will be possible when he lets God help him let go of the things that possess him. *"All things are possible with God."*

This October, we as a parish are reflecting in stewardship. Last Sunday focused on our willingness to be good stewards of God's gift of time by devoting our time to our relationship with God and God's family and to serving God's kingdom. On this second Stewardship Sunday, we focus on being good stewards of **God's gift of treasure**. Do we possess wealth or does wealth possess us? Do we see ourselves as possessors of wealth or as stewards of wealth that God has entrusted to us? How is our wealth serving the mission of Christ and the family of God on earth? What part of our wealth are we setting aside for needs beyond our own and those of our household?

In recent months, some Catholics have decided to withhold contributions to their local parish and the broader church in response to the recent report on the concealment of clergy sexual abuse of minors in the dioceses of western

Pennsylvania. The anger and mistrust are understandable. However, a similar decision made by many Catholics sixteen years ago clearly did not bring about the desired change. Instead, it has led to hundreds of valuable lay ministers losing their jobs for lack of resources; valuable church ministries have been cut back or eliminated. I suggest that by offering our material wealth, to the extent that each of us is able, and *demanding transparency* from pastors and bishops in spending that wealth, *we strengthen the parish community and have a greater impact* in shaping the church of the present and future.

This weekend, ministers from our parish music ministry share their stories of being good stewards. They speak of what this parish and the church has done for them and how their gratitude has led them to deeper stewardship in all areas. How might we best place our gifts of treasure, in whatever form, at the service of the gospel and the mission and ministries of this parish and the larger church?

The parish annual report, to be published next month, will reveal an operating deficit of \$95,000 for the fiscal year that ended June 30. I know that many parish households already are contributing at a level that reflects your ability to sacrifice in gratitude for the gifts God has given you. Increased participation in the automated giving program also has increased our Sunday offering (see information elsewhere in this bulletin for how to enroll). Funding our mission and ministries involves each of us doing our part, witnessing to why we do so, and inviting others to join us. God has provided our faith community of St. Francis Xavier with all that we need, to do all that God asks of us. We need only contribute our part, and let God work the miracle.

These are words from Solomon that we hear in today's first reading from the Book of Wisdom. Solomon was told by God that he could make any request and that it would be granted to him. Solomon did not ask for power, riches, health or good looks. Rather he prayed for prudence and wisdom, and all good things in life came together for him.

Google defines prudence as cautious and wisdom as sound judgement. I'm sure we have all prayed or will pray for both at some time or another in our lifetime. As prudence and wisdom continue to become part of who we are, then the messages in today's readings don't become as difficult to bare or to hear.

"Go, sell what you have, and give to the poor and you will have treasure in heaven; then come follow me." Reaching out in Christian charity to those less fortunate makes what sounds like a most difficult task in today's gospel one that we are already called to do by our baptism. Don't you see it happening all around you? Our B.E.D.S. Program, the Food Pantry, CROP walk contributions, St. Vincent de Paul clothing box, Sharing Parish donations and activities all call us to give of ourselves to others. And we do it.

"How hard it is for those who have wealth to enter the kingdom of God." We continually pray as a worshipping faith community that the nations of the world will share their abundant resources with the poor and needy of society.

"Good teacher, what must I do to inherit eternal life?" May all of us, as we continue to serve the Lord and reach out to others in this life, find ourselves one day rejoicing in God's kingdom.

**Come join us for Eucharistic Adoration!
October 18 at 6:00-7:00 pm**

WHAT: During Adoration, sometimes referred to as a Holy Hour (but can be of any duration), the Blessed Sacrament is exposed on the altar for individual, silent Adoration. As Catholics, we proclaim the Real Presence of Christ in the Blessed Sacrament, not only during the Mass but in the preserved Hosts. St. John Paul II offered that "our communal worship at Mass must go together with our personal worship of Jesus in Eucharistic adoration in order that our love may be complete."

HOW: Adorers are invited to pray a rosary or other devotions, meditate on Scripture or meditate on devotional books. Adorers may also choose to just simply sit and 'be' with Jesus. Regular adorers have found an appreciation for the devotion: "Adoration has taught me new ways to pray, meditation, and I've learned new prayers. If you don't think you will know what to do or you're not sure on what prayers to say... you will soon find your own way to be with Our Lord."

WHY: Since Apostolic times, Catholics rightly have gathered to celebrate Mass in community as Jesus instructed. Adoration provides an opportunity for an intimate relationship with Jesus through individual worship, prayer, and listening. And we shouldn't underestimate the power of silence, which is difficult to cultivate in our society. Pope Benedict XVI wrote: "In a world where there is so much noise, so much bewilderment, there is a need for silent adoration of Jesus concealed in the Host...It is a source of comfort and light, particularly to those who are suffering."

WHEN: Beginning on **October 18**, SFX will be exposing the Blessed Sacrament for Adoration *every* 3rd Thursday of the month in the Church from 6:00-7:00 pm.



From the Domestic Violence Outreach Ministry

October is Domestic Violence Awareness Month. Domestic violence is the leading cause of injury and death for women of all socioeconomic, ethnic, and cultural backgrounds, and affects up to 1 in 10 men and 1 in 3 teens. This month we present a series of survivor stories. **Note that these are intended for adult readers.** All names have been changed for protection.

Vanessa's Story

The abuse

At first my boyfriend was so considerate, and overly friendly. Once we started dating he started to accuse me of cheating on him and would call me a 'slut'. He would repeatedly call to "check-up" on me. One night, he held me down and wouldn't let me leave his house.

The worst part was that I went along with everything. He would break up with me, and then I would take him back. He blamed me for his behavior, saying that if I was trustable, he wouldn't have to check on me. He would ask my friends if I was trustworthy and would check to see if my car was at work.

Many women believe that they would recognize abuse, I believed that. I am an educated woman, from a good family, with a job, and a secure future. I never thought I would end up in an abusive relationship. It was so subtle – he stole my self-worth.

How I coped

After we broke up, he started to stalk me. I made two police reports against him and took him to court for a restraining order. I didn't get it. He followed me everywhere I went, sent lewd messages, threatened me. Six months later, he damaged my car. It has been a year since we broke up, my friends have been a good support and a local abuse support service has helped, too.

How the situation changed

I avoid places I know he goes. Every couple of months he sends a lewd message. However, I have been able to return to a normal life. I am careful about going places by myself. I have finally realized that I am not all the things he called me, and that I am lovable. I am in a healthy relationship now that is full of respect.

What helped me

He had convinced me that I was crazy and unlovable. I started going to the support service and became educated on the cycle of abuse. I saw so clearly that it wasn't my fault. A support group has shown me that I am not alone. Friends have stuck by me- they were there-they saw what happened.

What I would say to others

It is so easy to deny. I did not want to admit that I could be in an abusive relationship – I wanted to believe that he loved me. If friends and family tell you that there is something wrong with your relationship – really look at what they are saying. Don't give up your freedom or your self-worth. You deserve to be happy and to feel good about yourself. It may be hard to leave – but it will always be worth. Don't be afraid to seek legal help or counseling. You are worth it!





Peace & Justice Ministry members gather monthly to share information about all peace and justice topics. Their focus for 2018-19 is *Refugees*.

Every day, people around the world make the difficult decision to leave their countries in search of safety and better lives. WHY?

Currently, there are 68.5 million men, women and children escaping war, persecution and political turbulence. These are refugees and asylum seekers. There are others looking for jobs or an education, usually called migrants and people who want to live permanently in another country, referred to as immigrants.

Below are the distinctions between them.

REFUGEE

forced to flee their home because of war, violence or persecution; often without warning. Cannot return home safely.

ASYLUM SEEKER

seeks international protection from dangers in home country but whose claim for refugee status has not been determined legally. Must apply for protection in country of destination and must arrive at or cross border in order to apply. Cannot return home safely.

MIGRANT

moves from place to place (within own country or across borders), usually for economic reasons such as seasonal work, education opportunities, to improve lives or reunite with family. Can return home safely.

IMMIGRANT

makes a conscious decision to leave home and move to a foreign country with intention of settling there. Often go through a lengthy vetting process. Many become lawful permanent residents and eventually citizens. Can return home whenever they choose.




