Pastor's Notes

"What do you want me to do for you?" "I want to see."
Immediately he received his sight and followed Jesus on the way.
Mark 10:51-52

Jesus asks the blind Bartimaeus a strange question. What else would a blind man want except to be able to see? It seems that Jesus is inviting Bartimaeus into more than just his eyesight. In fact, upon receiving his eyesight, Bartimaeus follows Jesus "on the way," even though Jesus has proclaimed that this "way" will involve suffering and death. Jesus offers Bartimaeus both eyesight and *insight*; but first Bartimaeus must be willing to stand and walk – to stand with Jesus rather than sit by the side of the road and wait for Jesus to come to him.

We entered October with a reminder that God has entrusted humankind with the gifts of creation and appointed us to be good stewards of all God's gifts. We acknowledge that all is gift from a loving God and respond in gratitude and with a willingness to pay forward God's gifts in our service of others. **We devote our gift of time** to developing our relationship with God and others so that we might be rooted more deeply in who we are and what we are being called to do. **We give our gift of treasure** to nurture the seeds that God has planted among us so that our mission in Christ may bear fruit. **We share our gift of talent** so that the Body of Christ becomes vibrant through our outreach to others.

On this final October weekend, we are asked to offer a completed **Stewardship Intention Card**, naming the specific ways in which we personally intend to be good stewards of God's gifts of time, treasure, and talent. What we place on these intention cards will be held in confidence. If you want more information on practicing part of your stewardship of talent or treasure, please

indicate on the form that you would like to receive a call from us. If you want more information about your intent to practice stewardship of talent through a *specific* ministry in the Parish Ministry Guide, please call the ministry coordinator listed in the Ministry Guide or contact the parish office 708-352-0168.

Thank you to the parishioners who established a new opportunity for the stewardship of time for prayer through a monthly Eucharistic Adoration Hour on the third Thursday of the month at 6PM. Thank you to those who offered opportunities for the stewardship of time for presence through the Men's Club Pig Roast and the Parish Night at the Theater. Thanks in advance to those who are coordinating and participating in next weekend's Falcon 5K to support our parish elementary school.

Thanks be to God for the blessings of this parish and all who gather, give, and serve as the community of St. Francis Xavier Catholic Parish. I ask all of you to help spread the word to neighbors and friends in the community about what they might find here. Extend an invitation for others to join us as we seek to grow in our insight and together follow Jesus along the way.

We gather this Friday evening to remember parishioners and family members of parishioners who died this past year. Let us keep in prayer all who are mourning the loss of a loved one.

And in this Halloween Week, may your treats outweigh the tricks!

Scripture Reflection

Here it is again - Jesus asking, "What do you want me to do for you?" In last week's Gospel, James and John were asking for power and prestige. Today, this blind man, Bartimaeus, is asking for sight.

Bartimaeus has a great deal to teach us through this brief encounter with Jesus.

- Jesus calls us, listens to us, and cares for us.
- Faith is a powerful force, and faith can help open our eyes to new possibilities. As theologian John Shea writes, "Faith cures blindness by creating in consciousness a passionate quest for deeper revelation."
- Faith moves us to action. At that time, beggars would spread a cloak on the ground to collect alms. When Jesus called him, Bartimaeus "threw aside his cloak, sprang up," and went to him. He then became a disciple.

Jesus has promised to be with us always. Consider having your own conversation with him around his question: "What do you want me to do for you?"

Come join us for Eucharistic Adoration!

November 15 at 6:00-7:00 pm

WHAT: During Adoration, sometimes referred to as a Holy Hour (but can be of any duration), the Blessed Sacrament is exposed on the altar for individual, silent Adoration. As Catholics, we proclaim the Real Presence of Christ in the Blessed Sacrament, not only during the Mass but in the preserved Hosts. St. John Paul II offered that "our communal worship at Mass must go together with our personal worship of Jesus in Eucharistic adoration in order that our love may be complete."

HOW: Adorers are invited to pray a rosary or other devotions, meditate on Scripture or meditate on devotional books. Adorers may also choose to just simply sit and 'be' with Jesus. If you are interested, prayer and reflection suggestions are available as starting points.

WHO: Jesus waits for us, each of us, in the Eucharist. He waits when we are joyful, thankful, frustrated, or tired. All are welcome, including children. He specifically calls children to Himself, "Let the children come to me."

WHY: Since Apostolic times, Catholics rightly have gathered to celebrate Mass in community as Jesus instructed. Adoration provides an opportunity for an intimate relationship with Jesus through individual worship, prayer, and listening. And we shouldn't underestimate the power of silence, which is difficult to cultivate in our society. Pope Benedict XVI wrote: "In a world where there is so much noise, so much bewilderment, there is a need for silent adoration of Jesus concealed in the Host...It is a source of comfort and light, particularly to those who are suffering."

WHEN: The next opportunity for Eucharistic Adoration will be **November 15**. The Blessed Sacrament will be exposed from 6:00-7:00 pm. 
2019 Summer Mission Trip

October is Domestic Violence Awareness Month. Domestic violence is the leading cause of injury and death for women of all socioeconomic, ethnic, and cultural backgrounds, and affects up to 1 in 10 men and 1 in 3 teens. We invite you to join us to raise awareness and stand in solidarity with all those affected by violence.

How to Take Care of Yourself After Domestic Abuse

1. Breathe. Take 30 seconds a day for deep breathing. Start by taking a deep, slow breath in through your nose lasting five or six seconds. Then breathe out slowly through your mouth for about seven seconds. Breathing is an important part of your health, and it may feel like you haven't breathed for the duration of your relationship. It's as if you held your breath waiting for the next fight, the next rage, the other shoe to drop. It's OK. You can breathe. You can heal. Your life can now begin again.

2. No Contact. This is one of the biggest components of healing yourself. Abusers can be like drugs. So don't tempt yourself to use. After months of no contact, the fog will slowly lift. You will begin to see your inner strength—the you that was there all along. And you will begin to see the darkness of your abuser. If you have children with the abuser, and share custody of children, you can ask a trusted family member or friend to pick up the children at a drop off point. I know this will be more difficult, but it's better in the long run.

3. Talk. If your finances allow, I highly recommend professional counseling. Take advantage of free services provided by local and national domestic violence organizations. Many can refer you to counselors in your area who work on a sliding fee scale. You can also use these organizations to find therapy groups specializing in domestic violence. You can also find online forums and support groups. These are a great way to connect with others without leaving the comfort of your home. Of course, talk to trusted friends and family members.

What you went through was not normal and being validated by people you trust or grow to trust is an important part of healing. And when you don't process your pain, you leave yourself open to a host of physical and mental health issues.

4. Find self-care activities that work for you. Here are some of the things that I've found helpful: Write five things you're thankful for every night; Pray; Exercise; Write; Cook; Read or get a massage.

Anything you can do to kick your endorphins up and express the deep pain you have held in for so long. Don't be afraid to try new things. After I left my abusive relationship I took up kickboxing and jujitsu. I only lasted six months, but I got in great shape while I channeled my anger.

5. Educate yourself. Take advantage of free resources online. Learn the cycles of abuse. Become familiar with the patterns and tactics of abusers. Understand the power and control wheel. Once you educate yourself, you can teach those around you. If you have children, it's critical that you educate them.

Knowledge is power. The more you learn about yourself and abuse, the more control you will gain.

If you're still in an abusive relationship, we believe in you just as much. We also know that you will leave if and when you are ready. You are the expert of your own life and will control when and how you will leave. Please consider using resources like the National Domestic Violence Hotline 800-799-7233 (SAFE) to safely plan and choose the path that is best for you. ~Rachel Madson Zarling



From the Old Testament story of Exodus to the Gospel story of Mary and Joseph fleeing with their newborn, God repeatedly tells us the story of refugees fleeing from oppression. And in accordance with God's Word, the Catholic church has a long tradition of championing the rights of immigrants. As immigration issues continue to play out in our nation's political arena, we thought it would be helpful to point out that the Church has articulated its stand on immigration in a set of specific teachings: [Three Basic Principles of Catholic Social Teaching on Immigration](#)

First Principle : People have the right to migrate to sustain their lives and the lives of their families. This is based on the biblical teaching that the goods of the earth belong to all people and every person has an equal right to receive from the earth what is necessary for life - food, clothing, shelter, education, medical care, freedom of religious and cultural expression. It is clearly not God's will that some of his children should live in luxury while others have nothing. The Gospel of Luke rebukes the rich man who lives well while a poor man starves on his doorstep (Lk 16:19-31). In God's eyes the native does not have greater rights than the immigrant, and those who live in fear, danger or dehumanizing poverty have a God-given right to move.

Second Principle : A country has the right to regulate its borders and to control immigration. Catholic social teaching is realistic: while the Church believes that individuals have a right to move in search of safety and sustenance it also recognizes that no country has the duty to receive so many immigrants that's its own social and economic life are jeopardized. Immigration laws are often born out of a sense of loyalty to the common good and compassion to poor people seeking a better life. In an ideal world there would be no need for immigration control. The Church recognizes that this ideal world has not been achieved.

Third Principle : A country must regulate its borders with justice and mercy. The second principle might seem to negate the first - but the first two must be understood from the context of the third: that in the eyes of God all people are equal and any determination of a "greater common good" must include the welfare and rights of immigrants as well as the natives. A country's regulation of its borders must be governed by a concern for ALL people and by mercy and justice. "There is neither Jew nor Greek...for you are all one in Christ Jesus" (Gal 3:28). In Christ, the human race is one before God, equal in dignity and rights.

So as you consider the immigration issues facing our nation, we urge you to reflect on Catholic social teachings and recognize that: A **just** immigration policy must respect human dignity, must not seek to punish those who are immigrating to escape danger or poverty, and must recognize the plight of those who have lived and contributed to their adopted country for years. And a **merciful** immigration policy must recognize the sanctity of families and parental bonds by not separating families.




