

Pastor's Notes

Wisdom is readily perceived by those who love her and found by those who seek her. Wisdom 6:12

I write this on Election Day with no way of knowing who or whether someone will have been declared the winner of the Presidential election when you read this. Whatever the outcome of the election, I pray that now we all are *seeking the wisdom* to come together as one nation of many diverse people and striving to heal the divisions and conflicts of this election year. Such actions are crucial to our democracy and are central to who and how we are called to be as disciples of Jesus.

This weekend at the Saturday 5PM Mass, we commission the members of the new Parish Pastoral Council (PPC). This PPC will serve within the revised structure approved by the parish last autumn. (A description of this structure is included in this bulletin.) Their official commissioning had been scheduled for last Pentecost but was postponed due to COVID-19. Their guidance and feedback in our parish response to COVID has been helpful in recent months. These women and men come from various points in life and various perspectives within our parish family. Some may be known to you; others will be new to you. They are older, younger, single, married, with children of various ages, and empty nesters. Their purpose is to bring their diverse voices together to advise me and the parish staff on how best to respond to the physical, formational, and spiritual needs of St. Francis Xavier Parish. Over the next few weeks, the bulletin will include a picture and a brief biography of several members; these also will be posted on the PPC page on the parish website. They welcome your comments and suggestions about what is good about our parish, about the major challenges facing us,

and about how we can best grow as a community of faith. I thank them for their willingness to serve the parish in this way. I hope you will get to know at least a few of them well.

Over the past few weeks, COVID-19 became a more personal part of our parish community. We celebrated the funeral of one of our young adults. Members of the parish staff and school community have had to guarantine due to possible exposure, including Fr. Rich (whose doctor has asked him to extend his guarantine for a bit longer). And at the beginning of the week, we learned of our first COVID-19 positive cases within our parish elementary school community. Our school administration and facilities staff continue to ensure that all safety procedures protocols and sanitizing are maintained within the Education Building and throughout the school day. This includes how we respond to a report of a positive COVID test or possible COVID symptoms. I thank our school and parish faculty and staff for the care and concern they continue to show for our children and their families and for one another.

We also have tightened some of the office protocols to minimize the possibility of spread among employees and volunteers. This includes a two-week quarantine for anyone who travels out of state. As a gesture of concern for your fellow parishioners, I am asking everyone to observe the same two-week quarantine after out -of-state travel before returning to services in the church. God has given us the wisdom to care for one another during this time. May we accept, use, and be grateful for the gift.

Scout Troop 33 Wreath Sale





The Parish Pastoral Council (PPC) is a key advisory group to the pastor. The PPC can take various forms, based on how best to gather the "voice" of the parish, live the mission of the parish, and encourage the investment of parish resources in a way that best serves that mission. In the fall of 2019, parishioners approved a new structure for our Parish Pastoral Council. Members of the renewed PPC have been discerned and are being commissioned at the Saturday 5PM Mass this weekend.

SFX PARISH PASTORAL COUNCIL RENEWED STRUCTURE

Mission Statement

The St. Francis Xavier Parish Pastoral Council (PPC) supports and animates the parish mission as an advisory group to the parish pastor and pastoral staff.

<u>Purpose</u>

The PPC supports, enlivens, and advances the mission of the parish, and serves as a consultative group to the parish pastor and pastoral staff.

The PPC is a sounding-board for the pastor and offers input and advice on various issues that relate to the life and wellbeing of the parish. Issues may be brought to the PPC by the pastor, members of the PPC, or other parishioners. The PPC is drawn from a cross-section of the parish and provides the pastor with a collective wisdom from which he can draw in the exercise of his pastoral leadership of the parish.

Structure and Membership

The PPC is comprised of parishioners of St. Francis Xavier Parish. The PPC can fluctuate between ten and fourteen members, based on what best serves the parish at a given point in time. The PPC meets with the pastor at least nine times each year. Individuals from parish groups or ministries may be invited by the pastor or the PPC to share their insights and perspectives in certain conversations; likewise, a parishioner may ask to be placed on the PPC agenda. In addition, the PPC periodically holds open parish Town Hall meetings to seek parishioner input and feedback. The PPC may form subcommittees to promote progress on larger issues. Approved minutes of PPC meetings are published on the parish website.

Responsibilities and Expectations

PPC members do <u>not</u> represent a specific ministry, constituency, or group within the parish; each member represents the parish <u>overall</u>. The PPC seeks to respect diverse perspectives among PPC members and works toward consensus on issues that require a decision or recommendation. PPC members are expected to be present at all PPC meetings and at all meetings hosted by the PPC (e.g., Town Halls). Members of PPC also make it a priority to attend key parish activities and fundraising events.

Terms of Service and Selection of Members

PPC members serve a two-year term. Each spring the Pastor invites the PPC, parish staff, and <u>all</u> parishioners to suggest candidates. In consultation with the pastoral staff and PPC, the pastor designates new PPC members from among the candidates. If for any reason a member of the PPC cannot complete a term, the pastor consults with the PPC and designates a replacement for the remainder of that member's term.

The pastor and the members of the PPC select a Chairperson from among its members. The Chair serves a two-year term. The Pastor and members of the PPC also designate a vice-chairperson to serve in the absence of the Chair, and a secretary to prepare minutes of all PPC meetings. These officers each also serve a two-year term.

Rotation of Members – Staggered Terms

The PPC will attempt to replace no more than one half its members every two years to provide for continuity for the PPC. Members can ask to serve for a second consecutive term; the Pastor will consult with PPC members to determine what is best for the PPC moving forward. After leaving the PPC, a member must wait at least five years before returning to the PPC. but may return to the Council after an interval of at least five years.

WHAT: As Catholics, we proclaim the Real Presence of Christ in the Blessed Sacrament, not only during the Mass but in the preserved Hosts. "Jesus remains in the Blessed Sacrament to give us the privilege of approaching him personally as so many people were able to do two-thousand years ago in Galilee and Judea" (Fr. F. Racine). During Eucharistic Adoration, the Blessed Sacrament is exposed on the altar for individual, silent adoration.

HOW: Adorers are invited to meditate on Scripture or read devotional books, pray the rosary or another devotion. You may also choose to just simply sit and 'be' with Jesus. If you are interested, prayer, and reflection suggestions are available as starting points.

WHO: Jesus waits for us, each one of us, in the Eucharist. He waits when you are joyful, thankful, frustrated, or tired. All are welcome, including children. He specifically calls children to Himself, "Let the children come to me."

WHY: Since Apostolic times, Catholics rightly have gathered to celebrate Mass in community as Jesus instructed. Adoration provides an opportunity for an intimate relationship with Jesus through individual worship, prayer, and listening. Adoration is the "face-to-face that leads to the "heart-to-heart" with Jesus.

WHEN: The next Eucharistic Adoration will be **Thursday, November 19**. The Blessed Sacrament will be exposed from 6:00-7:00 pm. Fr. Rich Milek will offer Benediction with the Blessed Sacrament at the end of the hour. Come when you are able for as long as your schedule allows. Will we have to keep the windows open during the winter to provide clean air? The short answer, no.


St. Francis Xavier Church has a regularly maintained HVAC system and has recently installed leading-edge indoor air quality technology to help reduce germs! The technology being used are Respricaire Plasma Oxidizers. This is the same air-treatment method hospitals use to effectively reduce harmful airborne contaminants and surface pollutants. It is a remarkable and effective "entire church" air treatment system.

We will open windows when weather permits and/or partially open the windows when the church is unoccupied. This adds to the indoor air quality of our well-ventilated beloved church.

lonic air purifiers (ionizers) clean the air by emitting negative ions, which are harmless to humans. This technology is different from ozone generators, which can have less desirable results.

Our Facilities Team continues to do everything possible to make returning to church comfortable and safe for those who choose to attend services.



"They were neighbors in the 1950s. They shared so many things. They spent hours of time in and out of each other's houses. They shared lots of laughs, supported each other through tears, and knew each other's fears. They were more than neighbors – they were very close friends.

In 1952, Madge and Grace had special news to share. They were both pregnant. Together they went through morning sickness and watched their waistlines disappear. The depth of their bonding reached a new level. My early childhood years are filled with many memories of the two of them sharing life. I can still see our two backyards, separated by a white picket fence. They would both hang wash on the line at the same time, chatting and laughing... Then there would be the times when they would lean on that white picket fence and talk in hushed voices. The seriousness of their postures would keep us at a distance...They'd exchange a gentle touch or a comforting glance, and we knew whatever it was, it was going to be all right." – Jeannie Hannemann, Elizabeth Ministry Founder

On October 4, the Feast of St. Francis of Assisi, Pope Francis released a new encyclical, *Fratelli Tutti: On Fraternity and Social Friendship.* This social encyclical explores building a culture of peace and dialogue in order to work together to care for each other as a human family, especially as we recover from the pandemic.

Chapter 1: Dark Clouds Over a Closed World

"A worldwide tragedy like the Covid-19 pandemic momentarily revived the sense that we are a global community, all in the same boat, where one person's problems are the problems of all. Once more we realized that no one is saved alone; we can only be saved together (32)."

Pope Francis gives a thorough description of the darkness he sees in the world today. First, political systems are regressing and the profit-based economic model "does not hesitate to exploit, discard and even kill human beings."

Second, there is a culture of indifference. By employing a strategy of ridicule, suspicion, and relentless criticism, one group can dominate and exclude another, creating a permanent state of disagreement, confrontation and even violence. The loneliness, fear and insecurity experienced by those who feel excluded are easy targets for "mafias" (i.e. gangs). Also, human rights are not universally respected, especially for women.

This culture of indifference especially affects the unborn, disabled, and elderly. Though connected globally, we do not see our brothers and sisters as our neighbors. This is most apparent in the absence of dignity for migrants at our borders and for many people impacted by the pandemic.

Pope Francis wants to strengthen the idea of social friendship and social peace in the face of an all-pervasive social violence, which he sees running through the economy, politics, and even through social media.

Reflection Questions:

How has the pandemic impacted you? Have you experienced a revived sense of community?

Chapter 2: A Stranger on the Road

"Each day we have to decide whether to be Good Samaritans or indifferent bystanders (69)."

The challenges named in the previous chapter highlight the need to reconsider our priorities on a personal, communal, and global level, before it is too late.

We can only succeed when we come together in love as sisters and brothers, with care like that shown by the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:25–37).

The Good Samaritan is a parable about a Jewish traveler who is stripped, beaten, and left wounded alongside the road. First a Jewish priest and then a Levite come by, but both avoid the man. Finally, a Samaritan happens upon the traveler. Samaritans and Jews despised each other, but the Samaritan helps the injured man. Jesus is described as telling the parable in response to the question from a lawyer, "And who is my neighbor?" The neighbor is the one who shows mercy to the injured man—the Good Samaritan.

The parable is a lesson not solely about charity, but also a transformative encounter of mercy. The pope provides a detailed description of each character in the story so the reader can ask "Who am I, who are we, in this story?"

So, who is my neighbor? Francis concludes this chapter by calling for catechesis and preaching that "speak more directly and clearly about the social meaning of existence, the fraternal dimension of spirituality, our conviction of the inalienable dignity of each person and our reasons for loving and accepting all our brothers and sisters."
