## **Pastor's Notes**

#### "Whatever you did for one of the least sisters or brothers of mine, you did for me." Matthew 25:40

This is the final parable in Matthew's gospel before his account of the Passion. He describes Christ the King as the good shepherd who embraces those who hear his voice and follow him. But this shepherd's voice is not proclaimed from a pulpit or shouted from a street corner. Jesus, the Good Shepherd speaks through the often quiet voice of those hungry and thirsty, or a stranger, or naked, or ill or in prison. Their voice often is missed by those who discard them as a nuisance or consider them too much trouble or unworthy of the effort to hear and respond. Jesus speak, gently yet persistently, through the voices of those most in need of love, care, dignity, or the basic physical essentials.

God bless those among us and around us who will be feeding the hungry, sheltering the homeless, comforting the sick, or welcoming the stranger as part of their Thanksgiving Feast. God bless all of us who will offer a prayer for those whose needs are so much greater than our own in the year in which our Thanksgiving tables may hold empty chairs for those unable to join us or at which we may be the only one at table. God bless the healthcare workers who will be caring for the critically ill, the men and women who will be working to keep us safe, and those with little in their lives who still will offer a prayer of gratitude for what they have.

We will gather for a special Mass of Thanksgiving this Thursday at 10AM. Due to seating limitations, reservations are required and can be made via the parish website or by calling the parish office. We have so much for which to be thankful. God has given us so many gifts to share. Let us give God thanks!

If we cannot find volunteers for these Masses <u>before December 13</u>, we will have to remove one or both Masses from the schedule.

**If church buildings are closed at Christmas**, we will livestream Masses at 5PM, Midnight and 11:00 AM, giving everyone a choice of their style of Mass. All three livestreams will remain available through the following Saturday and Sunday.



## **QUESTION OF THE WEEK**

*Will we have to keep the windows open during the winter to provide clean air?* The short answer, no.

St. Francis Xavier Church has a regularly maintained HVAC system and has recently installed leading-edge indoor air quality technology to help reduce germs! The technology being used are Respricaire Plasma Oxidizers. This is the same air-treatment method hospitals use to effectively reduce harmful airborne contaminants and surface pollutants. It is a remarkable and effective "entire church" air treatment system.

We will open windows when weather permits and/or partially open the windows when the church is unoccupied. This adds to the indoor air quality of our wellventilated beloved church.

#### Are air purifiers with ionizers safe?

lonic air purifiers (ionizers) clean the air by emitting negative ions, which are harmless to humans. This technology is different from ozone generators, which can have less desirable results.

**Our Facilities Team** continues to do everything possible to make returning to church comfortable and safe for those who choose to attend services.

## **Parishioner Volunteers Needed**

Our ability to celebrate Baptisms, Weddings, Funerals, and weekday and Sunday Masses depends on the ability of the parish to provide ministers to offer a welcoming and healthy environment. We have been blessed by scores of parishioners who share their time and spirit to keep us moving forward. To establish a regular rotation of volunteers, we seek additional people, especially to greet and seat people, or to wipe down the seating areas after each service. We welcome anyone of high school age or older who is in good health. A few volunteer comments:

## Who benefits from blood donation?

At Versiti Blood Center of Illinois, formerly Heartland Blood Centers, we never forget the patients who receive the blood we collect. Every unit of blood is collected from volunteer donors who meet specific criteria and have been screened according to strict guidelines. Every unit (pint) is collected, transported, tested and stored according to tightly-controlled procedures.

## Examples of transfusion needs are:

- Cancer: up to 8 units/month
- Bone Marrow Transplant: up to 2 units/day
- Liver Transplant: up to 100 units
- Auto Accident: up to 50 units
- Cardiovascular Surgery: 2-25 units

## Peace and Justice

On October 4, the Feast of St. Francis of Assisi, Pope Francis released a new encyclical, *Fratelli Tutti: On Fraternity and Social Friendship*. This social encyclical explores building a culture of peace and dialogue in order to work together to care for each other as a human family, especially as we recover from the pandemic.



The Maryknoll Office for Global Concerns has created a **6-page study guide for** *Fratelli Tutti*. In this study guide, we offer key points and quotes from each chapter of *Fratelli Tutti*, along with reflection questions and the two prayers that Pope Francis includes at the end of the encyclical.

We hope this guide enables individuals and small groups to learn Pope Francis' teachings and use them to build peace and solidarity in your relationships, community, and world.

## **Chapter 5: A Better Kind of Politics**

"The marketplace, by itself, cannot resolve every problem, however much we are asked to believe this dogma of neoliberal faith... The fragility of world systems in the face of the pandemic has demonstrated that not everything can be resolved by market freedom ... we must put human dignity back at the center...(168)."

A "better kind of politics," Pope Francis says, is "truly at the service of the common good" and truly open to people, which makes it one of the most valuable forms of charity (154). Francis goes to lengths to explain the problems with the "populism" of today, which exploits the vulnerable for short-term gains. Likewise, he criticizes a form of liberalism which "serves the economic interests of the powerful." A better kind of politics also protects work, tackles poverty, and aims to find solutions to social problems which deny fundamental human rights, including hunger, human trafficking and other social exclusions. Pope Francis repeats a critique that the international community wasted an opportunity for reform after the financial crisis of 2007-08. "Indeed, it appears that the actual strategies developed... fostered greater individualism, less integration and increased freedom for the truly powerful, who always find a way to escape unscathed (170)." Francis also notes the need for reform at the United Nations and international finance institutions, so "the family of nations can acquire real teeth (173)." He closes by repeating lines from Laudato Si': "politics must not be subject to the economy" and "true statecraft is manifest when, in difficult times, we uphold high principles and think of the long-term common good (178)." Finally, Francis says politics can be a noble act when centered on the human dignity of all brothers and sisters.

#### **Reflection Questions:**

### Chapter 6: Dialogue and Friendship in Society

"...[Once] kindness becomes a culture within society it transforms lifestyles, relationships and the ways ideas are discussed and compared. Kindness facilitates the quest for consensus; it opens new paths where hostility and conflict would burn all bridges" (224).

The Holy Father explains that authentic dialogue is necessary for building a better world. Pope Francis first addresses the shortcomings of discourse in social and journalistic media, which he says can foster a "feverish exchange of opinions" or "parallel monologues" rather than true dialogue (202). "Social dialogue" requires interlocutors who each deeply respect the other's experiences and values. Dialogue can help us lead to "social consensus" based on facts and reasoning, but more importantly, it can help us recognize fundamental truths upon which we base our societies' moral principles. Absent moral reasoning and authentic search for truth, we lose the grounding of the meaning of life and human dignity. Pope Francis calls for the careful cultivation of a "culture of encounter" which can help us transcend our divisions and differences as we work together to pursue the common good. Such a culture is hard won, requiring effort and sacrifice from all of us. He closes the chapter by calling us to "recover kindness" in a renewed, enriched sense - a kindness which is an antidote to indifference, based not merely on civility but on genuine concern for others.

**Reflection Questions:** 

Have you ever experienced such a "culture of encounter?" What would it look like to cultivate it in your own neighborhood or community?
