Pastor's Notes

We are the clay, and you are the potter: we are all the work of your hands. Isaiah 64:7

Advent returns with an image of clay in the hands of a potter. **We** are like that clay; still being shaped by God's loving hands; not yet baked into our final form. Whether we are fifteen or fifty or ninety, this is God's desire and hope for us. God is hindered <u>only</u> by our refusal to be shaped any further. Or in the words of John, "We are God's children now. What we shall be has not yet been revealed." Advent invites us to open ourselves to the ways in which God desires to shape our lives at <u>this</u> moment in time; to realize that we continue to become someone and something beyond what we yet can know.

Thanksgiving deadlines require me to write this eight days before Thanksgiving Day. I cannot know how the coronavirus may have reshaped our living in the intervening days. Undoubtedly, we will have made some changes in our routines; many certainly will have had to alter Thanksgiving Day celebrations and weekend traditions. Yet none of this will have affected the work of the Potter; God continues to shape us and smooth out our rough edges. God gazes upon the potter's wheel with wonder and delight, and perhaps occasional surprise at what is taking shape with God's guidance and our response.

I encourage you to share a bit of God's wonder and delight as we prepare to celebrate the coming of Christ into our world. The openness of a very young woman and a young carpenter to the messages of angels that would reshape their lives lead us to Bethlehem. Through the birth of their Child, something has been added to the clay of our lives that never can be taken away. God came not only to dwell among us but *to dwell in us*. As the light of Christ grows brighter on the Advent wreath, may we also see Christ reflected in the lights of Christmas trees, house eaves, hedges, and street posts. May we open our hearts and minds to the ways in which Christ is still coming to birth in and through us as the Potter gently spins his wheel.

A special thanks to our Art and Environment "elves" who prepared the church for Advent. You can view their artistry from a link provided via Instagram and Facebook and on the parish website. Our parish Christmas plans continue to take shape. We still need <u>new</u> volunteers to serve as greeters and restorers and enable us to offer Masses on Christmas Eve at 7PM and at Midnight. We have adapted our annual Giving Tree for this Christmas and will offer other ways in which you may choose to share with others in the coming days. Stay tuned.

Thank you to those who have been able to respond to the Finance Council's request for an increase of at least 2-3% in your regular giving. The generosity of parishioners during the past nine months has kept our mission vibrant. If you have not yet increased your regular contribution *and are able to do so*, please give this some serious consideration. God bless you all.

This weekend we light one candle against the darkness. May the light of Christ continue to shine within us and from us to others.

Peace and Justice

On October 4, the Feast of St. Francis of Assisi, Pope Francis released a new encyclical, *Fratelli Tutti: On Fraternity and Social Friendship*. This social encyclical explores building a culture of peace and dialogue in order to work together to care for each other as a human family, especially as we recover from the pandemic.



The Maryknoll Office for Global Concerns has created a 6-page study guide for Fratelli

Tutti. In this study guide, we offer key points and quotes from each chapter of *Fratelli Tutti*, along with reflection questions and the two prayers that Pope Francis includes at the end of the encyclical.

We hope this guide enables individuals and small groups to learn Pope Francis' teachings and use them to build peace and solidarity in your relationships, community, and world.

Chapter 7: Paths of Renewed Encounter

"Those who work for tranquil social coexistence should never forget that inequality and lack of integral human development make peace impossible" (235).

Pope Francis calls for peacemakers to forge new paths of healing and "renewed encounter" in our fractured world. He begins by explaining that building peace requires "starting anew from the truth," or facing the reality of the harm done. The Holy Father writes that, in the difficult work of building a peaceful society, "[there] is an 'architecture' of peace, to which different institutions of society contribute, each according to its own area of expertise, but there is also an 'art' of peace that involves us all," including ordinary people and especially the most vulnerable (231). Pope Francis describes the importance of reconciliation and its relationship to forgiveness, explaining that while forgiveness is central to Christianity, it does not mean forgetting harm done and it cannot be required of victims. Memory is important; we cannot forget tragedies such as the Holocaust or the atomic bombings in Japan, lest we repeat these catastrophic mistakes. Finally, Pope Francis develops the Church's teaching on the irrationality of the "false answers" of the death penalty and war, including the use or threat of nuclear, chemical or biological weapons. In the modern world "[we] can no longer think of war as a solution, because its risks will probably always be greater than its supposed benefits... it is very difficult nowadays to invoke the rational criteria elaborated in earlier centuries to speak of the possibility of a 'just war (258)." Likewise, he says the use of the death penalty makes no sense in a world where it is possible to keep society safe without it. Pope Francis clearly states the Church's opposition to the use of the death penalty.

Reflection Questions: How can you be involved in the "art" of building peace in your community or society?

Chapter 8: Religions at the Service of Fraternity in Our World

"As believers, we are convinced that, without an openness to the Father of all, there will be no solid and stable reasons for an appeal to fraternity (272)."

Pope Francis shares his belief and hope that the religions of the world can be at the "service of fraternity." He writes, "we, the believers of the different religions, know that our witness to God benefits our societies. The effort to seek God with a sincere heart, provided it is never sullied by ideological or self-serving aims, helps us recognize one another as travelling companions, truly brothers and sisters (274)." People of faith are called to work together to build bridges and seek the common good. Because religious tradition provides the transcendental values that are the bedrock of social morality, the Church "does not restrict her mission to the private sphere," nor "remain on the sidelines" in the building of a better world, but rather seeks to "reawaken the spiritual energy' that can contribute to the betterment of society (276)." Francis reiterates that, while the Church proclaims the Gospel of Jesus Christ, it "esteems the way in which God works in other religions" and "rejects nothing of what is true and holy in these religions," affirming especially that which contributes to the common good (277). Pope Francis believes that "a journey of peace is possible between religions" and that violence is a "distortion" of our fundamental religious convictions (281-282). Based on his encounter with the Grand Imam Ahmad Al-Tayyeb, he makes an appeal for peace, justice, and fraternity among people of faith. To conclude he names several others whose work inspired the encyclical, including Gandhi, Martin Luther King.

Reflection Questions: Have you had an encounter with someone of another faith that made you feel we are "brothers and sisters all?"
