Pastor's Notes

"You shall love your neighbor as yourself." Matthew 22:39

The second greatest commandment comprises *two* commandments. Love of neighbor in the Christian sense requires a prior love for myself. It is not selfish. On the contrary, it is coming to see *myself* as God's beloved child. It is embracing my gifts and my limitations and accepting that I am all that God needs me to be to accomplish God's desires for me. It is to accept that God sometimes uses even my weaknesses as an instrument of grace. I then open the path to loving others, especially those who confuse or irritate me. How often have we realized that we may find it hardest to love in another what we have not yet come to love in ourselves?

Our October reflections on the dignity of life from conception throughout life on earth to natural death conclude with a consideration of the *natural* end of our lives on earth: a *natural death*. We do not take issue with the peaceful death of a loved one who has lived a long and good life. However, natural death often involves illness and weakness and struggles from which we would spare our loved Hospice care has come a long way in ones. providing comfort to those who are dying and their families. Still, we might struggle to see value in the natural death of one who is suffering. Or we might fail to see value in the "living" of those with serious mental or physical impairments. And we might struggle to see dignity in the life of someone convicted of a brutal crime, or who has inflicted great suffering on others.

To love the life that God has given me is to accept that there is dignity even when I feel least dignified. To love another in this way is to comfort them with whatever natural means are available and to be God's presence in the very depths of their suffering. This is the witness of Mary and John at the foot of the Cross of Jesus; and it may be the most powerful testimony of faith we can offer. We remain present to the dying, the suffering, and the condemned as instruments of the presence of God. We do what we can to ease their pain and struggle without direct human intervention to end their lives. We proclaim that God never abandons us, even when seems so. Our acts of love toward the suffering and dying, and our advocacy for death as a *natural* process, proclaim the mystery that our lives are so much more than what we experience within time and space.

As you read this, I am nearing the end of my annual eight-day silent retreat. You are in my prayers as I spend time with the Lord in the beauty of the foothills of the Rocky Mountains. I ask your prayers for me in this time.

I will return in time for the celebration of "All Hallows Eve." With the limits imposed upon us by the coronavirus, perhaps it is a good year to reflect on the Christian origins of Halloween. Our ancestors "baptized" the customs of England and other countries to honor deceased relatives. Favorite foods of a family's ancestors were left at doorstep for the ancestors to enjoy during the night. Over time, children began to travel from house to house so that these treats would not go to waste. Were they to find that a family had left nothing at the door, they would play a trick on that household to express the disappointment of the ancestors. Hence, it was a night for "Trick or Treat." Christians moved it to the eve of All Saints (All Hallows) Day to remember the saints and other ancestors in prayer. May we do so with love and fondness, thus avoiding the tricks.

QUESTION OF THE WEEK

Will we have to keep the windows open during the winter to provide clean air?

No. This past summer, the parish installed four air sterilizers into the main air supply of the church. The units are commercial ionic photo-oxidation air purifiers. The air is sterilized/sanitized/purified as it passes through the main duct and through the grates in the nave of the church. We were able to obtain these units through a generous contribution from a parishioner who is an HVAC professional.

During the summer, the air conditioned air followed this path and has sanitized the air in church through most of the summer and autumn. The air in the church has constantly been cleaned and/or replaced by a combination of using the air sterilizers and partially opening the windows during the day. This winter, in addition to heating the church through convection from the radiators behind the grates, we also will activate the air handling system so that the heated air continues to be sanitized. Whenever weather permits, we also will continue to introduce fresh air into the church by <u>slightly</u> opening windows, especially when the church is not occupied. Are air purifiers with ionizers safe? Ionic air purifiers (ionizers) clean the air by emitting negative ions, which are harmless to humans. This is different from ozone generators, which can emit high levels of ozone that may have negative health effects.

Our Facilities Team continues to do everything possible to make returning to church comfortable and safe for those who choose to attend services.

Domestic Violence Outreach

Who Are the Victims?

¹Twenty-five percent of American women and eight percent of American men will experience domestic violence at some point in their lives. Children are very often witnesses and victims themselves.

This statistic does not include the vast number of unreported incidents of violence.

There is no evidence that the prevalence of domestic violence is any lower within faith communities.

What is Domestic Violence?

²Domestic violence (also known as spouse abuse, partner violence, intimate-partner violence, battering, and numerous other terms) is a pattern of coercion used by one person to exert power and control over another person in the context of a dating, family, or household relationship. The spectrum of domestic violence includes much more than physical assault. Domestic violence encompasses a constellation of controlling behaviors that include:

Actual or threatened physical harm, psychological abuse, and forced sexual contact; Economic control; Social isolation; Destruction of a victim's property, keepsakes, or personal possessions; Abuse of animals/ pets; Misuse of divine beings or religious beliefs, practices, teachings and traditions as well as asserting male superiority and attributing abusive behavior to cultural traditions.

These behaviors can occur in any combination, sporadically or chronically, over a period of up to several decades.

Most victims of domestic violence are women in heterosexual relationships. Men in heterosexual relationships can also be victims of domestic violence, in addition to both women and men in same-sex relationships. Regardless of culture, race, religion, or socio-economic class, approximately 90 percent of reported domestic violence cases involve men who abuse women.

Dear Quest teens, parents, and leaders,

Come, Holy Spirit! We are so grateful for your patience as we navigate Quest logistics amidst COVID-19. We have been thinking long and hard about how to make Quest the most life-giving and **Spirit-inspired** program it can be for our teens as they prepare for the sacrament of Confirmation – an amazing sacrament that truly has the power to transform our lives and the world when we receive the gift of the Holy Spirit sincerely.

We are pleased to announce that **Quest will begin in November** – in-person and virtually according to teen and parent comfort levels. For in-person meetings to occur, Quest groups must have unanimous consensus on meeting in-person (amongst both the teens and the parents.) Each teen and parent will also sign an agreement not to attend in-person if they are ill. Groups of about 10 teens will meet once a month and will set their own meeting dates/times. Prevent the flu: Get vaccinated every year

With COVID-19 also affecting our community, the flu vaccine is more important this year than ever. Influenza, commonly called "the flu," is a viral infection of the respiratory tract that may cause symptoms very similar to those of COVID-19.

Everyone six months of age and older should get a flu vaccine every season.

Flu vaccine is provided at many local health departments, private health care providers and pharmacies across Illinois. Contact your health care provider to find out which flu vaccine is right for you or you can

find vaccine locations at vaccinefinder.org.

Most people who get the flu recover completely in one to two weeks, but some people develop **serious** and potentially life-threatening medical complications, such as pneumonia.

Over the past decade, influenza and pneumonia have been linked to an average of **3,500 deaths** a year in Illinois.

Between **10 and 20 percent of Americans** are infected during most flu seasons, which typically run from October through May.

More than **200,000 people** are hospitalized by the flu each year in the U.S.

Symptoms of flu include:

- Fever
- Headache
- Extreme tiredness
- Dry cough
- Sore throat
- Runny or stuffy nose
- Muscle aches
- Stomach symptoms, such as nausea, vomiting, and diarrhea also can occur but are more common in children than adults.

Emergency Warning Signs

Seek emergency medical care if you or someone you know is having any of the following warning signs below.

In children, emergency warningsigns that need urgent medical attention include:

- Fast breathing or trouble breathing
- Bluishskin color
- Not drinking enough fluids
- Not waking up or not interacting
- Being so irritable that the child does not want to be held
- Fever with a rash

In adults, emergency warning signs that need urgent medical attention include:

- Difficulty breathing or shortness of breath
- Pain or pressure in the chest or abdomen
- Sudden dizziness
- Confusion
- Severe or persistent vomiting

Seek emergency medical care if you or someone you know is experiencing any of the signs above.
